### **4-H Interactive Exhibit**

The 4-H Interactive Exhibit contest is the perfect chance for you to show and tell others something related to a 4-H project area!

You will make a physical visual aid/ Display and then present it to the class. The topic of your exhibit must be informative and must fit within one of the 4-H project areas.

This contest is open to all 6th, 7th, and 8th graders

Interactive exhibit total time is 2-7 minutes. 4-H member will be expected to explain their exhibit then ask for questions


## **Explanation**

Just like a speech, your explanation of your exhibit should have three main parts.

- 1. The Introduction: This is where you grab your audiences' attention. State your purpose of your exhibit, introduce your project, and begin showing off your display.
- 2. The Body: Is the main part of your explanation. Make sure you talk about background information, why this topic is interesting to you, what you have learned from this topic, and share a cool experience with the class. During the body of your explanation you will point out all of the parts of your display, describe them, and give supporting information.
- 3. The Conclusion: This is where you summarize the main points of your exhibit. Show off any other products you brought that compliment your exhibit.

## Visual Aid

Your visual aid board can include a poster board, tri-fold board, or project board as well as any items that enhance your overall exhibit.

### Planning:

- 1. Choose a topic you know.
- 2. List the important details and information.
- 3. Decide what information you want to share.
- 4. Outline the explanation.
- 5. Plan visuals. BE NEAT!

#### **Presentation**

- 1. Always face the audience.
- 2. Stand with good posture.
- 3. Use posters.
- 4. Don't let accidents stop you.
- 5. Ask for questions at the end.

- 1. Ask your teachers about what you can bring to school.
- 2. No live animals
